First things first, why did I write this?

It's because I heard of so many compatibility problems with TI-Connect and Vista and I wanted to set the record strait, especially as I have Vista...I've seen many things saying this won't work and I even emailed TI-cares and got a reply that it's not compatible but it's hard to transfer calculator programs without this...not to mention I need this working for math class.

Long story short, it works exactly the same as Windows XP.

My system: Windows Vista Home Premium (32-bit Vista) [Service Pack 1] **IMPORTANT NOTE**: I have received feedback that this is <u>NOT</u> compatible with 64-bit editions of Windows Vista. If you are unsure which you have, refer to my addendum on page 10.


Agree to be a slave to TI...or just accept the licence and hit Next

Be patient, their time estimate is not very good...




After a while it'll give you this warning – basically saying it's not made by Microsoft


